



President's Message

Just over a year ago, the official dedication of the new building and first public walk through of the new East High School took place. The bare walls and nearly empty display cases were an invitation to re-create the home of the Eagle Empire. The sterile feel of the first days in the new building is gradually warming with the addition of trophies, plaques, and pictures in display cases. Artwork that includes different eagle sculptures and the relief bust of first East principal, Emil Paripovich, has been placed in the entry hallways. The competition gym is a sight to behold with the new video scoreboard, state championship team photographs, and athletic team banners. Imagine how overwhelmed visiting teams must feel coming into the new gym! They have told us so!! A new Tuffy wall painting oversees the spot where the Cannon resides – well, we hope it resides there next year! Alumni Foundation Hall of Fame member photographs have been placed in first floor display cases and the large marble Class Tiles, once a feature of the Heritage Hall, have been installed at the base of the west stairway. Recently, window decals have been added to a number of classroom doors and program areas, and there are more to come. The decals, which clearly identify the class or program (e.g., DECA or a science lab), provide an enhanced level of security as they conceal the area from the outside while allowing faculty and students on the inside to easily monitor approaching individuals. These, and other security measures including restricted building access, have become an unfortunate need in today's schools.

The outside grounds are beautifully landscaped and, once the new sporting fields are completed, the entire campus block will have a park-like feel. Welcoming the Eastside to the building are the recently repainted wrought iron Eagle and the IB sculptures. A new IB logo will go up on the south facing exterior wall that faces Constitution Road. Tuffy, which adorned the old building's auditorium, has been placed high on the wall overlooking the main entrance. Several of the State Championship team medallions that were on the old gym overlooking the student parking lot now hang on the east side of the new building where they are clearly visible from MacNeil Road. The remaining medallions will go up after they are displayed during this year's graduation. Placed under exterior lighting, the medallions are really striking at night.

Several members of the Alumni Foundation met with East High's Student Council to discuss current and future school branding opportunities. We were impressed by the keen observations shared by the students. One of the first comments made was that the new building did not feel like home yet. Our discussion then focused on their opportunities to make the building their home and the home for generations of Eagles to come. We will all use a thoughtful approach to planning the home of future Eagles now that the rush to get the new building set up and establish a routine has passed. The excitement of being in a new building will continue to grow.

With an expected fifty-year building life span, we have one year down and forty-nine to go!

“Eagle Pride” Is Celebrated In Space

The Spring 2023 edition of *The Golden Eagle Flyer* “Where Are They Now” section highlighted the career of 1976 East graduate and East Golden Eagle Hall of Fame member **Paul Marshall**.

Paul is Assistant Program Manager of NASA’s Orion Program at the Johnson Space Center (JSC) in Houston, TX. Orion is NASA’s deep space next generation spaceship designed to operate with other exploration elements to return astronauts to the moon and on to Mars as part of NASA’s new Artemis space exploration missions, the successors to the historic Apollo missions.



In December 2022, on the first integrated test mission, Artemis I, an uncrewed Orion ventured 1.4 million miles to orbit the moon, reaching farther from Earth than any prior spacecraft designed for human exploration. Newsletter readers were alerted that included in that flight was an item of “historical interest” to East High School which Paul promised to present to East.

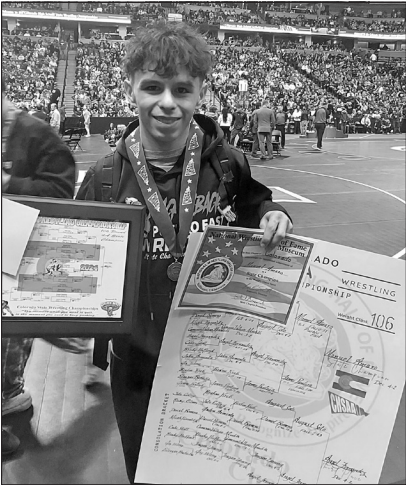
This past December, Paul returned to East High School and before a surprised and delighted student audience presented to the school that item—a “Pride” sticker from Paul’s days as a member of East’s football team. The historic Pride sticker was worn on the helmets of East’s football teams in the 1970s and 1980s, helping establish East’s school identity and culture, and the East community rallying cry.

The sticker is encased in a plaque commemorating the spaceflight and Orion mission which Paul presented to Principal **Andy Clementi**.

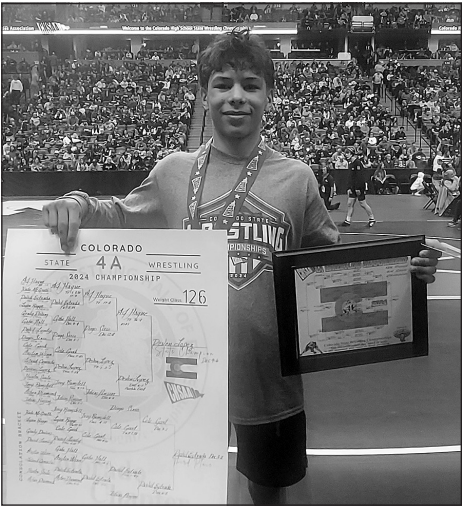

As winter sports came to a close in 2024, East High School continued with their success on the wrestling mat! East had two individual state champions and earned a 2nd place finish as a team. Junior, **Manuel “Pocky” Amaro** (below) earned his first state title at the 106-pound classification, finishing his season with a 42-4 record. Freshman **Deven Lopez** (right) earned his first state title at 126 pounds and finished

Other state placers include Junior **Niko Fernandez** 2nd place, Junior **Julian Espinoza** 3rd place, Sophomore **Justus Freeman** 3rd place, and Junior **Elijah Contreras** took 6th. With the retirement of longtime Hall of Fame coach, **Pat Laughlin**, the well-oiled machine and high expectations were handed over to **Tyler Lundquist**. Coach Tyler and the team are already back to work - practicing in advance of next season where the Eagles should enter the season

with a 1st place ranking.

On the hardwood, the young Eagle basketball teams were just shy of making the playoffs. Both boys’ and girls’ teams showed off their talent with big wins in league competition. Sophomore **Myah Abeyta** earned the league scoring title and was named to the South Central League first team. Next year will be an exciting year for both teams!

DECA, under the direction of Ms. **Jacqueline Armenta**, brought back a 3rd place in the State competition and 1st place in District 9 for raising the most money for Judi’s House, a foundation that provides the highest quality care to grieving children and families. HALLS OF FAME

Golden Eagle Hall of Fame

On April 18, 2024, the newest members of the Golden Eagle Hall of Fame will be formally inducted at the East High School Gymnasium. The ceremony starts at 10:13 a.m. and will be followed by a reception in the East Media Center. Joining the Hall of Fame are **Rich Lane**, East Class of 1980, **Jeff Falletta**, Class of 1988, and **Devona and Kevin Walter**, Class of 1986 and 1985, respectively. There will also be a dinner that evening at the Pueblo Country Club, 3200 8th Avenue, to which all are invited. The dinner, with a cash bar at 5:45 pm and the meal at 6:30 pm, is an informal way to share the Hall of Fame honor with our inductees and enjoy the day's events.

Rich Lane was a four-year scholarship track athlete at the University of Southern Colorado (now CSU-Pueblo) and graduated with a Bachelor of Science-Physics Engineering degree. After college he married **Mary Potestio** and they have been married for 36 years. He worked for Rockwell International at Rocky Flats, Sperry/Unisys/Loral in Pueblo, Quantum in CO Springs, DD Marketing, and as manager at Champions Family Medical Clinic. He is also a small business owner. Rich played and coached for the Pueblo Crusaders semi-pro football team. He was a founding member of "Friends of Football" which in 2007 donated \$8 million in cash and in-kind donations to CSU Pueblo to resurrect football, wrestling, and women's track and field at the university and to support scholarships. Rich has made outstanding achievements and contributions as varsity football offensive coordinator at East for 16 years. In 2015, he received the National Football Foundation's Jim Turner Award for 27 years of service to Colorado youth football and he was elected to the Greater Pueblo Sports Association Hall of Fame in 2017.

As a 2nd generation Eagle, **Jeff Falletta**, comes from a family of East Eagles. His mother, **Sandy Komorny Harbert**, graduated in 1965. Jeff is married to **Andrea**, and they have daughters **Caitlyn** (East Class of 2015) and **Reagan** (East Class of 2027). Jeff, formerly a Belmont Rattler, Heaton Hawk, as well as an East Eagle, attended the University of Arizona and graduated in 1992 with an Economics Degree. Jeff has been an active, original member of the East Alumni Foundation since it began in 2002. He assisted **John Caligaris** in creating the East Athletic Hall of Fame in 2005 and has worked on every induction ceremony. In honor of his mother, he has funded an annual memorial scholarship since 2020 and he also funds the Athletic Hall of Fame ceremonies. He finds his biggest joy in his girls and their successes.

Devona and Kevin Walter are very involved East High graduates and currently serve as Board Members on the East Alumni Foundation. Kevin is an outstanding member of our community and is currently a sales associate at American Furniture. He has quite a loyal client base because of his honesty and integrity. Devona, with Bachelor's degree in Psychology from CSU Pueblo and a Master's degree in Social Work from CSU Fort Collins, is a school social worker for District 60. Kevin and Devona were instrumental in starting "Parents Promoting Music" at East when their son **Ryan** was an East student. They continued their work with the program supporting their other children, **Kenny and Divina**. Devona and Kevin's children developed their love of music from their parents. Kevin played saxophone in Jazz Band and Devona played clarinet. They were both in marching band and Devona excelled in school as an honor student. They have always been active serving and giving selflessly to others. Kevin and Devona were high school sweethearts and have been married for 30 years.

Six talented past students and one former teacher will be inducted into the East High Activities Hall of Fame at 10:13 am on Thursday, October 10. The Activities Hall of Fame recognizes success in extra-curricular activities including Speech and Debate, Vocal and Instrumental

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Music, DECA, FBLA, and the Family, Career, and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) program. This year's inductees are:

Dominic Lira (Class of 2013) Dominic was a two-time State Debate qualifier, District FBLA placegetter, and Boys State representative.

Marizza Mitchell (Class of 2013) Marizza, being inducted posthumously, received numerous honors in DECA where she was National Vice-President and a Colorado State Officer with 1st place awards at District three times, 2nd place awards at State two times, a 4th place State award, and three time International qualifier with one 5th place finish.

Victoria Klimuk (Class of 2016) Victoria is being recognized for her achievements in Speech and Debate where she was qualified for State three times, receiving a 6th place award, and a national qualifier. She was also a Girls State representative.

Cora Aubert (Class of 2019) Cora was another DECA award winner qualifying for both State and National competition.

Zek Kelly (Class of 2019) Zek excelled in both Vocal and Instrumental Music where he was a member of the All-State Choir, twice selected to the Adams State University Top of Nation Choir, an All-State Band alternate, and a member of the East High Marching Band (two-time band captain), the Concert and Jazz Bands, Orchestra, and the Les Jongleurs and Tone Troopers choral groups. Zek was a Boys State Representative.

Tori Pacheco (Class of 2019) Like Cora, Tori was a DECA State and National qualifier.

Also being recognized will be retired teacher **Marilyn Wagner** for more than 30-years in the classroom as a dedicated FCCLA instructor and student coach.

SHORT SPOTS ON SPORTS

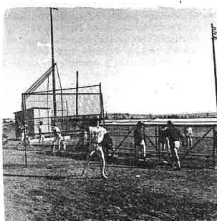

PUEBLO EAST HIGH SCHOOL ALUMNI Programs, Memorabilia, and Traditions 2024 DONATION DRIVE

With a mission of maintaining and perpetuating the traditions of East High, raising funds to support East's programs, and enhancing the educational experience for East Eagles, the Alumni Foundation relies heavily on the generous contributions of East Alumni, staff, family, and friends. What we try to do cannot be done without YOU. As we prepared to open the new building for the 2023-2024 school year, we challenged graduating classes and individuals to contribute to the academics, activities, or athletic programs that impacted their lives or lives of family members. **Between January 2023 and March 2024, more than \$175,000 has been donated directly to East High in support of this challenge.** The Fall 2023 edition of *The Golden Eagle Flyer* identified the different programs that had benefited from your donations as well as the purchase of the video scoreboard for the competition gym and a 3D scanner for the Media Studies program. A new \$3,000 portable public address and speaker system was purchased by the Alumni Foundation for use in future outdoor sporting events and school programs.

The Alumni Foundation recently donated a 2024 John Deere Gator EV and tow-behind utility cart to the school for use on the grounds of East and at future East outdoor sporting, recreational, and/or community events.



utility cart to the school for use on the grounds of East and at future East outdoor sporting, recreational, and/or community events. The Gator and utility cart, valued at \$13,998, was fully funded by donations from the East High Class of 1973. The Gator will be repainted in East's gold and white colors, and will feature a variety of East logos prior to delivery to the school. The Gator uses standard building power and does not require a special charging station.

Continuing our efforts to preserve East's heritage, Tuffy (relocated from the outside of the old auditorium) welcomes students, staff, and visitors at the entrance of the new building. Athletic teams' State Championship Medallions are going up on the east side of the building and will oversee the new sporting fields. Two new plaques recognizing past and future valedictorians, salutatorians, and top scholars has just been completed and a new plaque listing student council presidents is in the works. Each plaque is valued at nearly \$2,000. Display cases are gradually being filled with trophies, memorabilia, and photographs, and plans are in the works to purchase additional display cases.

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A prominent feature of the old Heritage Hall, Class Tiles are now displayed at the bottom of the west stairway in the new building. Contact the Alumni Foundation if you want to have your class tile displayed in the new building.

The need to support the tremendous programs and activities at East are not over. There are numerous treasures still to be displayed and classroom needs are never fully met. If you are able, please financially support East High School and its efforts to develop future community and family leaders.
